Looking ahead for 2022/23


May welcomes Mental Health Awareness Week 2022, and as such you are likely to see many television programmes, celebrity social media posts and themed events related to people's struggles and experiences with mental health.

We hear from hundreds of young people in Winchester looking for support for a host of reasons. In such uncertain times there are two things we are sure of; that statutory support is extremely hard to access, and the referrals that we receive are becoming

more and more complex.

We thought it best to take this opportunity to give our supporters some more information about what we will be doing this coming year to make the situation better for young people in Winchester.

Following 12 months of planning and preparing since the arrival of our first CEO, the organisation is introducing some new opportunities for young people. As announced in the previous newsletter, we have plans in place to double our monthly counselling



provision by the end of 2022.

Beyond the essential clinical work we do, we want young people to be able to come to us without an appointment and speak to a staff member for information and advice about our services and others' and for practical support on mental health and wellbeing. We are introducing a mental health drop-in service for the start of the 2022/23 academic year.

Another exciting development is that we will be introducing a Youth Board. The Youth Board will be an essential advisory group for WYC as well as being visible in the community, at fundraising events, and most importantly have a representative present at WYC trustees' meetings. We are extremely excited about putting young people in a position to make changes and influence our work. This group is due to start in the summer 2022.
